Episode 8: In Harmony

Having the same practice as any Thai institutions, kids at Sotpattana School for the Deaf gather each morning in front of the school to salute the national flag. Our orphans in pre-school levels also join them each weekday at 8:10 hours.

I was wondering how it worked when I first saw the assembly, so, from a distance, I took five minutes to observe it. It began when teachers and carers of orphans organized the lines of children, while two kids, a boy and a girl, represented the crowd ready to raise the flag to the top of the pole, and one teacher of the Deaf School stood in front of them. Once the recorded national anthem played, the orphans sang along, and simultaneously, the teacher in front signed for the deaf who followed with the sign language. Both the singing and signing ended at the same time and everybody bowed expressing their respect. A teacher then led the gathering for a few more minutes, using both speech and signs, before dismissing the children to their respective classes.

It was a communication method well developed for harmonious living between the deaf and the normal kids.
